From the Pastor's Desk:

During Lent, our congregations have been engaged in a Bible study of the last week of Jesus life. Combined with our fellowship meal and our mission speakers, it has proved necessary to limit the scope of these studies to as little as one specific event, or even a single verse of the text. Any given verse of the gospels can become an exhaustive study of language, authorship, source, old testaments references, history, and current models of interpretation. And that is true even if we limit ourselves to the literature we consider authoritative, the 66 books of our Bible. Beyond what we consider the authentic books of our scriptures, there were other gospels written that are not in the New Testament, perhaps for good reason. One tells of lions and panthers that worshipped baby Jesus and showed Mary and Joseph the way to Egypt and protected them as they came back to Nazareth. The Infancy Gospel of Thomas contains fables about Jesus performing miracles when he was boy, such as breathing life into clay birds that He had made, or that He spoke at the time of His birth, or that He could tell what was in the hearts of other children. It also says that he was mean to his parents and performed miracles to keep them in fear of him. When which books to include in our modern Bibles was being decided, such writings were rejected for their suspect content.

And yet, even in our current texts, we encounter some rather fantastic tales. In a recent study regarding the Jerusalem temple, we were reminded that Jesus, though he was probably exempt, paid his and Peter's share of the annual Temple tax. *Matthew 17: 24-27*. It was how he got the money for the tax that is rather unbelievable. Jesus told Peter to go to the lake, drop in a hook, and the first fish he caught would have a coin in its mouth, which he was to use to pay the tax, which is just what happened.

Now it could be that a consideration of this story would involve a study of ancient fishing practices in Galilee during the time of Jesus, and of the different species of fish that brood their eggs and young fish in their mouths, and the origins of the practice of throwing coins into fountains in search of good fortune, and of the coinage in use during the first century in Palestine and on and on and on.

Or, maybe we are best served by looking at the meaning of the story, as it might be applied to ourselves. Perhaps what we should take from the story is that we should avoid offending others. Our purpose as Christians is to help make others more receptive to the gospel by our example, and not less.

Sometimes we need to avoid claiming our rights for the benefit of others. Jesus, though he may not have technically been required to pay his share for the support of the temple, chose to do so, that he might not offend the sensibility of others, and potentially inhibit their relationship with God, and with himself. The story also reminds us that what we do about our offerings and our giving, is ultimately between God and ourselves.

We might also consider this odd tale as informing our understanding of the resurrection story of Easter. As God's Son, Jesus does not need to pay the temple tax but he chose to pay it for himself and for Peter. In the same way He chose to die on the cross to pay for all our sins. The coin was the precise amount to pay tax for two people. His death on the cross is the precise and exact and perfect price to redeem all believers. The method of providing the tax payment that Jesus chose (the coin in the fish) is unexpected and odd; just as the Messiah's death on the cross was unexpected and odd to his followers.

Many meanings can be extracted from our Bible stories, especially the amazing good news of the events of Easter morning. Perhaps what ultimately matters the most is what does each of us believe, and what will we choose to do about it?
