From the Pastor's Desk:

A TRUE STORY

In a nearly new home, the owners were going about their housecleaning when they noticed an unusual discoloration appearing under one of the interior window sills. An icy trickle of fear ran down their backs all the way to their wallet. Could it be....mold? Mold can be a very serious and expensive business. Mold can produce mytoxins and release nasty spores into the air which may be harmful to one's health. Mold remediation can be very expensive, with the need for great specialized air filters and the blasting away of the offending mold with tiny pellets of frozen CO2 to kill without harsh chemicals or residue, not to mention the cost of fixing the underlying causes of the mold, such as leaking pipes, roofs, or other improper construction.

Oh No!

Fortunately, the mold expert declared the mysterious markings were not mold, and extensive examination of the property and subsequent lab tests revealed everything was okay. The marks on the wall were a mystery, and in fact, the expert said that if the homeowner ever discovered what they were, he would appreciate a call letting him know. There would be no expensive remediation required. Whew!

I heard this story not long ago, but it had begun to slip from my memory when a strange thing happened. I was doing a bit of studying, and setting my Bible down, it randomly fell open to *Leviticus 14*. A major portion of *Leviticus 14* is dedicated to mildew in houses. Without going into too much detail, the final remediation process for mildew in a home according to *Leviticus* may require tearing the whole house apart, disposing of it, rebuilding, re-plastering, and recertifying the house as ritually clean – which requires two birds, some cedar wood, a red cord, a sprig of hyssop, a clay bowl, spring water, and a priest. Yikes!

Honestly, I am not quite sure what to say about that, except for this: Our Bible is a divinely inspired and unimaginably complicated piece of literature. That list of components for the purification ceremony in *Leviticus* may represent traditions which go back thousands of years, and we may never again comprehend the full significance of each element of that story. Or someday, we might. Until that time, the challenge may be for us to continue faithfully reading our scriptures, to be open to the inspiration of the Holy Spirit to grant us true understanding, and to decide each day how we might allow God's word to guide us and shape us as the people of God and the Body of Christ.


